Congress Divided by Jake Mazetis

On April 5th, there will be an election over something that will decide Park Hill's future. Voters will be voting on the No-Tax-Increase Bond Issue. The bond is worth 49.5 million dollars, and will pay for maintenance, technology, security, classroom space, and a new elementary school. Park Hill has put off a lot of needed projects to save money, and avoided budget cuts and job losses. This bond will give Park Hill access to 2.5 million dollars added to the budget each year for 5 years. ment without raising taxes.

So what is a bond exactly? The No-Tax-Increase Bond

Last November, our great nation held elections for the seats in both the House of Representatives and the Senate. Before this election, both parts of Congress had a Democratic majority, meaning that there were more Democratic than Republican Representatives and Senators in public office. After these elections, however, the balance of power shifted. The formerly Democratic House became Republican, and the Senate only just retained its Democratic majority. Due to the change of power in The House, the Speaker of The House also changes. The Speaker belongs to whichever political power has the most members in the House of Representatives. Before the election, Nanci Pelosi held this prestigious title. Although, now it is time for a Republican to become The Speaker. John Boehner, a Representative from Ohio's Eighth District, was sworn in on January 5th, 2011.

Now, what in the political world would cause such a change in what the voters wanted? Before I answer that question, let me give you the numbers. Prior to the election, 255 of 435 Representatives, and 57 of 100 Senators belonged to the Democratic Party, while only 179 Representatives and 41 Senators were Republicans. After the election, though, the Democrats had only 193 Representatives, and 51 Senators. This means that the Republican took about 62 seats in the House, and 6 seats in the Senate. It is interesting to note that the Tea Party (Tea stands for Taxed Enough Already), a new branch of the Republican Party, has gained quite a large following. Their influence is very strong in states such as Florida.

It seems that the decline in Democratic Congress members may have been the result of several un-popular laws passed by our present Democratic President, Mr. Barack Obama. These laws include things such as the very controversial Health Care Reform, and the repeal of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" which keeps gays from serving openly in the US military. These decisions seemed to lead some of the more conservative Democrats to support Republican candidates.

Before we look at the interesting political climate in DC, let's review some basic facts about our government. In order for a law to become a law, it must first be approved by both the House of Representatives, and the Senate. If either of them should not say that they do not like the law, then the law goes away. However, if the House of Representatives, The Senate, and The President all OK the proposed law, then it becomes a law.

New laws will probably be hard to come by this political season. Since the two parties each have control of a different part of Congress, whatever laws go through will have to make both parties happy. Since the Democrats and the Republicans are such opposites, finding that middle ground can be tough. Suffice to say, it should be an interesting year for politics.



My family and I have lived in Kampala, Uganda for about 4 months. I haven't liked living here, but I have enjoyed meeting the people.

One of the things I don't like is not being with the rest of my family. I am really missing our host students Ana, Nadjia, Orkhan, and Parvana. I also miss both my sets of grandparents, but the person I miss the most is my four year old host sister, Leyla. Sometimes we would get into fights but we did everything together.

Although the rest of my family is not here, it is still very nerve racking to do random tasks with my mom and dad. Your patience can really run thin here in Kampala. For instance when we were in Gulu (a place not too far from

Kampala) it was dinner time and we were hungry, so we ordered a pizza. At home a pizza normally can only take up to 30-45 min. Here it took about 2 hours and 30 min. It can really make you mad because making a pizza is not the hardest thing to do in the world. Also one day my mom and I needed to get plastic buckets. These buckets were for the orphans we help. Honestly, it took the company about 2 full hours to run in their warehouse, get the buckets, and bring them to us. As you can tell, things can take much, much longer in Uganda.

Although your patience really runs thin in Africa, some of the food can make up for it. However, most of the food in Africa tasted pretty bad to me. When you go to the grocery store (here they call it Nakumatt) you see pretty normal looking things such as bread, eggs, and cakes. The bread is just as hard as a rock, and super dry. When I eat eggs here they make me sick, so I can't eat them. The cakes look very beautiful and delicious. I wish they tasted as good as they looked, because they are very dry and tasteless

Nothing here tastes or looks the same except for Fanta. The only thing I really like is the bakery goods. The things the bakery at the Nakumatt has mainly are meat pies, cheese pies, cakes, bread, meat, and veggie samosas, a crunchy fried meat dumpling.

Many students believe thatfour minutes isn't enough time to get to your classes on time. They also think that teachers are too strict and a bit ridiculous on tardies. Many teachers will count you tardy even if you're up sharpening your pencil and the bell rings, they tell you "That's what passing time is for." Also, students have to use the restroom in between classes, and four minutes just simply isn't enough time to put away your things, get your stuff for next hour, use the restroom, and be in your seat by time the bell rings. Possible Card Changes

Several years ago, Lakeview came up with a system to improve students' grades and behavior. We call it the card system. The highest card is a purple card. To get a purple card, you must have grades of two Cs or better with four or less citizenship marks, and no in or out of school suspensions. The card lower than the purple is the silver card. The requirements for the silver card are eight or less citizenship marks, no in or out of school suspensions, and one D or better. No cards are the lowest card level. The no card hasn't any privileges or incentives and is lower than the silver card restrictions.

Many students at Lakeview enjoy the incentives that come with the cards. The only card that has no or little incentives is the no card. Silver cards can enjoy individual team incentive parties, an end-of-year incentive, using 10 hall passes per quarter, and receiving 30 extra minutes at dances for eighth graders. Purple cards get the most incentives. They include leaving for lunch one minute early, receiving 30 extra minutes at dances, walking in halls without hall passes, participating in open gym during the week at lunch individual team incentives, an end-of-year field trip for being a purple or silver card all year long, and the use of iPods/mp3 players in class during independent work time.

During a class meeting a while back, the topic of eliminating the silver card or adding in a higher card above the purple card were brought up. Many people thought the silver card didn't have enough incentives. I asked a few students what they thought about having a silver card or having a higher card. One student, Alex Scott said, "I think [the higher card] could be beneficial if they increased the incentives on the lower cards." Using the responses from the students, Dr. Teeter is looking at making changes to the card system. Dr. Teeter said, "In April we will have a meeting..." He also told me that if they add or have a higher card that some incentives might include basketball games, reduced cost for the dances, or even an outside lunch. I feel that if they decided to have a higher card, then they should keep the silver card, but add more incentives to the lower cards.
